# STANDING UP FOR VULNERABLE CANADIANS Cathay Wagantall, MP | Yorkton—Melville

Through Bill C-311: the Violence Against Pregnant Women Act, Conservatives are taking action to protect vulnerable women from abuse.

Women face a greater risk of violence when pregnant, but current punishments for their attackers are not required to take pregnancy into account. That is wrong. My bill would add two new aggravating factors to the Criminal Code. Knowingly assaulting and causing physical or emotional harm to a pregnant woman would be given the same weight as other protected grounds such as race and religion. Judges would be required to consider these new aggravating factors when issuing criminal sentences.

There are over eighty recent cases where pregnant women have been killed by attackers who knew they were pregnant and sought to intentionally harm the mother and the child she had chosen to carry to term — often seeking to end the pregnancy. Our courts should be empowered to issue sentences that match the crime committed. I encourage you to support bill C-311 by signing the petitions available at CathayWagantall.ca/ PregnantWomen.

# FIGHTING LIBERAL CENSORSHIP Kevin Waugh, MP | Saskatoon—Grasswood

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# FIXING OUR IMMIGRATION SYSTEM Brad Redekopp, MP | Saskatoon West

As the Vice-Chair of the Immigration Committee, I am constantly reminded that our immigration system is very broken. Saskatoon West has one of the highest immigration rates in Saskatchewan, so I bring a lot of my constituents' experiences to the committee.

Coming to Canada and contributing to our economy can be challenging. Many newly arrived doctors are driving taxis. Nurses are homecare workers and pharmacists are sweeping floors. Our immigration system brings people to Canada for their skills then tells them that they cannot contribute to our economy in the job they trained for.

Conservatives have put forward a plan to strengthen our economy by recognizing that credentials and on-the-job training abroad are acceptable if they meet our standards. No more red tape and endless testing by big government gatekeepers protecting their own turf. Under a Conservative government, newcomers will know if they can work in their field within 60 days of landing.

These common-sense policies help newcomers settle in Canada and help everyone else looking for a doctor, a nurse, a carpenter, an electrician, a plumber, or anyone else we need to get us through the day.

#### TRANSPARENT GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS

After eight years of Justin Trudeau, Canadians are out of money and struggling to put food on the table and pay their mortgage. However, it has never been a better time to be a high-priced consultant or insider friend of the federal Liberal government.

Since 2015, the Liberals have vaporized tens of billions of dollars on high-priced consultants, including at least \$116 million to their friends at McKinsey. Yet despite this huge price tag, media reports have quoted senior public servants who say they have no idea what McKinsey did in return for these contracts.

We know the Liberals won't be transparent about where this money went and we can't trust them to investigate themselves. That's why Conservatives called for the Auditor General to conduct an investigation and a performance-and-value-for-money audit of all contracts awarded to McKinsey.

Canadians deserve answers. They deserve answers not simply on how much of their money was spent, but what exactly their money was spent on and what value they got from these contracts.

The Trudeau Government's inflationary deficits and tax hikes are fueling the cost-of-living crisis in Canada. The NDP-Liberal carbon tax is driving up the cost of everything including basic necessities, and it's even more punishing for Canadians living in rural communities like ours in Saskatchewan.

After years of claiming otherwise, the Minister of Environment and Climate Change has finally admitted that their carbon tax will cost most Canadians more than what they get back in rebates.

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In fact, the Parliamentary Budget Officer has said that their carbon tax will cost the average household \$710 this year after rebates. While the NDP Liberals continue to dive deeper and deeper into your pockets, they have yet to meet a single environmental target that they set for themselves. That's because the carbon tax is not an environmental plan, it's a tax plan.

Conservatives don't believe in punishing you for driving to work, heating your home or buying groceries. Conservatives will axe the carbon tax and use technology instead of taxes to fight climate change.
